Cllr Vic Walkington asked if the Thai Banks were the only land owners with whom the corporation was currently negotiating. Julie Gilhespie stated that negotiations were also active with Tata Group.

Cllr Glyn Nightingale asked if the completion of one of these negotiations would allow development to begin on this land before negotiations were completed with the other party. Julie Gilhespie confirmed that it could.

Cllr Philip Thomson requested details of the tendering for the servicing of the site, and whether the result of the ground condition assessment investigations could be shared with the Committee. Julie Gilhespie stated that servicing of the site was the responsibility of the South Tees Site Company, owned by the Department of Business, Energy, and Industrial Strategy.

Members held a discussion into the governance relationship between the Tees Valley Combined Authority and the South Tees Development Corporation with members being provided details of how the Corporation must refer decisions which may result in a financial, environmental or statutory liability to the Combined Authority for ratification, at which point it would be permissible for the Overview and Scrutiny Committee to consider the matter. Members were also provided with details of the Corporation's own governance arrangements, in particular its Audit & Risk Committee, upon which two members of the Combined Authority's Audit & Governance Committee sit.

The Chair requested that members be provided with a copy of the Development Corporation Constitution.

### OSC 32/18

### **UPDATE: BUDGET 2019/20**

Martin Waters, Head of Finance, Resources and Housing, briefed the committee on the timetable for the setting of the Combined Authority Budget for 2019/20.

Cllr Matt Vickers asked for confirmation that the Mayor of the Tees Valley was not intending to introduce a Mayoral Precept as part of this year's budget. Julie Gilhespie confirmed that this was the case.

Cllr Ian Haszledine, Vice-Chair of the Committee and Chair of the Budget Sub-Committee stated that the Sub-Committee's areas of interest while scrutinising the budget were likely to include the impact of Brexit, the devolution of the Adult Education Budget, remediation work on the South Tees Development Corporation site and Durham Tees Valley airport, and reiterated the committee's desire for further details to be provided on the nature of legal advice procured with regards to the airport to date.

A discussion by members – including Cllrs Heather Scott, Matt Vickers, Sonia Kane, Glynn Nightingale and the Chair – concluded

with the Chair stating that it may be necessary for the Committee to hold an extraordinary meeting on the subject of the airport – in private in the event of commercially and legally sensitive issues being discussed – as it had previously done in March 2018.

### OSC 33/18

#### PORTFOLIO UPDATE: TRANSPORT

Cllr Stephen Harker, portfolio holder for Transport and leader of Darlington Borough Council introduced a portfolio update by highlighting the Combined Authority's ambition to simultaneously improve the Tees Valley economy's global connectivity and improve intra-region transport for residents.

He drew the committee's attention to:

- The need to upgrade Darlington Station in preparation for the arrival of HS2 in the region.
- A recent meeting of Transport for the North critically assessing the performance of train operators and Network Rail.
- Key actions relating to transport being developed by the Combined Authority, including a new Tees Crossing.

The Chair inquired if the Combined Authority had been involved in a recent meeting addressing the accessibility of Billingham Station to residents with a disability, as reported in the press. Julie Gilhespie confirmed that the Combined Authority was involved in this process but had not attended that specific meeting.

Cllr Heather Scott requested timescales for the investigation into bus franchising as stated in the report. Fran Manancourt, Strategic Transport Planning Officer reported that the evidence-gathering necessary for this investigation was complicated and lengthy, but likely to be concluded within the next few months.

Cllr Philip Thomson requested a more detailed timetable for the delivery of the new Tees Crossing. Cllr Stephen Harker stated that these timetables were dependent on Highways England but attempts would be made to provide this for the committee.

Cllr Thomson asked if consideration was also being given to a further Tees Crossing to the east of the region. Fran Manancourt confirmed that a defeasibility study was being undertaken.

The Chair congratulated Cllr Harker on his recent election to the position of leader of Darlington Borough Council and thanked him for his attendance.

## REPORT OF PORTFOLIO HOLDER FOR INVESTMENT AND BUSINESS GROWTH

# <u>Overview and Scrutiny Committee Portfolio Update: Cllr Sue Jeffrey (Investment Portfolio)</u>

### 1. Overview of Investment Activity

- 1.1 The Investment Plan agreed by TVCA's Cabinet in April 2017 was built on our Tees Valley Strategic Economic Plan ("SEP"), reflecting our shared priorities for this region. The SEP sets out the growth ambitions and priorities for the Tees Valley over the period to 2026 and provides a framework for economic development activities. It has been refreshed to ensure it includes all the latest priorities to diversify and accelerate growth in the local economy, to benefit businesses and residents and to contribute to the overarching objectives of enhancing productivity and improving lifetime opportunities through the provision of more and better jobs accessible to all. The principle of inclusive growth underpins all that we do.
- 1.2 This financial year we have not made any fundamental changes to those SEP priorities or overall funding allocations. Over the year we have particularly focused on:-
  - accelerating delivery of the investment programme;
  - prioritising projects that will inform our 10 year investment strategy;
  - developing projects that can be funded and delivered through the Transforming Cities Fund (funding for transport connectivity);
  - streamlining our application and decision making processes, to make sure that projects are agreed and can get into delivery as soon as possible;
  - using development funding to ensure projects are planned and developed robustly, so they can come forward and get into delivery quickly once they are approved; and
  - "Testing" projects to make sure that they are funded commercially where this is feasible, to generate potential returns that can be recycled into other projects.

### 1.3 Set out below are:-

- an update on the Single Pot Arrangements;
- the work TVCA has been carrying out to prioritise projects for investment;
- an update on how we are investing our existing European funding and what we know about its successor programme the UK Shared Prosperity Fund;
- an update on our investment into projects and events in town centres;

- an update on investment into projects that are being brought forward by the private sector;
- a summary of the financial aspects of our Investment Plan, including the funding we have invested during the year;
- an update on the project investments highlighted in the previous OSC report; and
- highlights for the first six months of this year in terms of investment milestones and projects.

### 2. Single Pot arrangements

TVCA has a significant funding pot available for the region of around £500m of investment for the period 2016 to 2021. This is clear evidence that the decision of the five local authorities to negotiate a devolution deal with Government has paid off. Using our collective voice has put us in a stronger position to secure funds from Whitehall and manage them directly.

### 3. Prioritisation of Projects for TVCA Funding

Despite this success in securing additional funding, much of this has already been allocated and we now find ourselves with more project proposals than we have available resources for.

In early autumn we undertook the assessment of over 60 project proposals as part of a prioritisation exercise that will inform our 10 year investment strategy. Projects are being prioritised that will deliver the greatest economic and wider benefits for all, at the same time as focusing on delivering strong investment performance that will support our future requests to Government for additional funding.

There will also be a number of other projects which we will work to develop as commercial propositions or develop as part of a specific programme that will deliver on our strategic objectives. We will also continue to work on attracting new funding into our region and leveraging other public and private sector investment into our projects.

We expect to be able to publish this list of projects in early 2019.

#### 4. European Funding

One particular issue for us is making sure that we maximise the European funding that is still available to us as a region, which will continue until 2020/21.

- 4.1 Examples of projects that have successfully applied or are now applying for European Regional Development Funds ("ERDF") funding are:-
  - Teesside University's new National Horizons Centre construction of integrated research, training & innovation facility - includes £3.1m of ERDF (University's application) as match for TVCA's funding;
  - New office accommodation at Feethams, Darlington includes £2m of ERDF (DBC's application) as match for funding from TVCA and DBC;
  - CPI proposed Healthcare Futures Centre at Central Park £6m of ERDF (CPI's application) matching TVCA's funding; and
  - TWI proposed Materials Integrity, Research & Validation Centre in Middlesbrough -£4m ERDF (TWI's application).
- 4.2 Tees Valley is forecast to spend £12.91m of ERDF against a performance target for the end of December 2018 of £15.55m. For European Social Fund ("ESF"), Tees Valley has committed £32.5m of the performance target at the end of December 2018 of £34.1m; MHCLG are responsible for monitoring the contracts and spend with

the applicants. It may be difficult to access all the funding that is technically available to the region, as the parameters and conditions for its use are limited. We know from TVCA's experience of delivering Business Compass that there have been challenges in delivering some of the funds – the demand from businesses against the Innovation, ICT and Low Carbon funds has not been as high as we had hoped. This is partly due to the administrative bureaucracy of ERDF, the need for businesses to provide the match funding (just under 70%, which is their key challenge) and the restrictions on the eligible activities.

- 4.3 £21.1m of ERDF and £35m of ESF remain to be committed in Tees Valley through to the end of the European programme. An update report was presented to Cabinet in June 2018 and an action plan has been put in place that sets out measures to maximise our access to the funds. We are currently in the process of updating progress on the action plan.
- An open call for all ERDF priorities was held recently with a closing date of 23 November. As applications are made to MHCLG directly we do not yet know how many projects have been submitted against each of the priority themes. The theme that is at most risk of underspending is Priority 3 (SME Competitiveness) this call included the opportunity for a project to provide business grants to be delivered under the Business Compass brand, as a follow on to the current Business Compass Grants currently operated by BE Group on behalf of TVCA. If no other organisation has bid to do this TVCA will need to consider whether it bids to deliver (direct or externally procure) ongoing Business Compass grants.
- 4.5 The Government is planning to replace European Union funding with a new UK Shared Prosperity Fund ("UKSPF") which will start in 2021. A Government consultation paper is due to be published shortly and we have been feeding into discussions on its development. In summary we have four key asks:-
  - Our share of the UKSPF should be at least as much as we get now;
  - Government should continue to provide the equivalent in match funding;
  - The new framework for economic development and growth funds should also include successor funding to the Local Growth Fund at equivalent levels to what we currently receive; and
  - All funding should be provided without restrictions as part of the TVCA Single Pot.

### 5. Investment in Town Centres

The Committee has previously asked about town centre investment by TVCA.

- 5.1 The Investment Plan refers to the need to enhance town centres as the location for professional and business services, providing suitable space for business growth and supporting creative, cultural, digital and professional & business services. Supporting the creation of new business accommodation and improving access to and services in town centres will create new jobs and enable our residents to have better access to our key employment sites and leisure venues.
- 5.2 The table below lists the town centre investments that TVCA has either already committed or has for consideration in its pipeline of projects.

5.3 As TVCA is focusing on projects that will potentially have a Tees Valley wide impact, specific local actions aimed at improving high streets/retail facilities themselves remain the responsibility of our councils.

### 6. Private Sector Projects

6.1 We are now seeing approaches from private sector companies who have propositions for funding for new projects that could potentially have a significant effect on economic growth in the Tees Valley, and we are looking at the potential for TVCA to invest in those under the Research & Development/Innovation Theme of our Investment Plan. Recent Cabinet approvals for specific investments of this type of project are:-

- Liberty Steel investment of £4.6 million (loan/grant) to support Liberty Steel with an R&D project focused on developing and manufacturing new speciality alloy metal powders was approved by TVCA Cabinet in September; and
- Fujifilm Diosynth Cabinet will receive a report on 30 November to approve TVCA investment of £7m funding (a mix of grant and loan) to support the development of Fujifilm's Phase 1 bio-campus at their existing Billingham site.

Both projects have the potential to deliver significant jobs growth in the future.

6.2 A number of other private sector projects are also currently under review to see if they are suitable for investment under this Theme.

### 7. Investment Plan – Financial Performance

7.1 The table below sets out the projected spend from the TVCA single pot for projects that have been approved at the date this report was produced, for the period to March 2021 (this excludes specific grant funding programmes).

- i. We are aiming to spend £47.7m this financial year, consisting of £41.7m investment into specific projects and programmes with £6m to be invested by way of development funding. While TVCA staff are not directly delivering the majority of these projects we are working closely with their delivery teams to support progress.

Middlehaven	Work has been completed on construction of the new bridge at

Routes to work	TVCA secured the largest 'Routes to Work' pilot scheme in the	
	country with £6 million from DWP alongside £1.5m from TVCA.	

	The scheme provides a wrap-around service to help those furthest from the labour market into work. Since March 2018 our Councils have engaged with local job centres and communities to provide support to help local people move into sustainable employment. The pilot is continuing to develop and use innovative methods to provide support.
STDC	The 25 year master plan for the South Tees site was launched and aims to convert assets in the South Tees area into industrial opportunities for business investment. Progress to date includes significant work to understand the level of contamination on the site, but issues around land ownership and funding continue. Once fully developed the vision will see 20,000 jobs created and add an additional £1 billion per annum to the local economy.
Ingenium Park & Salters Lane	TVCA Cabinet approved a £3.9 million TVCA investment into Salters Lane/Ingenium Park infrastructure at Darlington. It will unlock 11.5 hectares of employment land and directly address the challenge of providing industrial sites and premises for business growth. Morton Palms car park has been completed. Infrastructure works on the Ingenium Park site are progressing with the McMullen Road roundabout on target for completion by 31 March 2019.
Transforming Cities Fund	In this year's Autumn Budget statement we received a further £16.5m for TCF. Work is currently being undertaken to develop the programme of investment to be delivered.
TeesAMP	TVCA Cabinet approved a £7.65 million investment in the new Teesside Advanced Manufacturing Park in Middlesbrough to remediate and develop the Enterprise Zone site. This will deliver 180,000sqft of advanced manufacturing space which can host 500 direct skilled jobs. Land has been acquired for development and work is progressing on the site. The TeesAMP development was officially launched on 20th September 2018.
Innovation and Skills Quarter – Phase 1	Work started on the Innovation & Skills Quarter in Hartlepool - this is an £8 million project with £5.5 million of TVCA investment. It will deliver 1,608sqm of high quality, affordable studio and workspace for start-up businesses and deliver a range of streetscape and connectivity improvements to connect the ISQ to Northern School of Art and the waterfront. The work on Church Street and Church Square is nearing completion, and work is due to start on improving access to Stockton Street in Quarter 4. Work is continuing on the BIZ managed workspace.
Teesside University National Horizons Centre	Construction began on the new Teesside University National Horizons Centre on the Central Park site in Darlington. The £17.5 million investment from TVCA will drive growth in the bioscience industries. The building is on target to be completed by the end of January 2019 with fit out completed by March 2019.
Feethams Office Accommodation	TVCA Cabinet also approved an investment of £3.23 million to deliver top quality office accommodation at Feethams in Darlington Town Centre. This is on a shared risk and reward basis with a potential return from rental income. Formal approval of Darlington Council's application for ERDF is expected imminently.
Kirkleatham	TVCA Cabinet approved a further £3.36 million (added to £2.7 million already allocated) for work to commence on the new Catering Academy, Walled Garden and site infrastructure at Kirkleatham Hall Estate in Redcar, which is currently on site and under way.

Middlesbrough	TVCA cabinet approved an investment of £2.5 million into works

### 10. Conclusion

- 10.1 We are continuing to focus on ongoing spend and delivery of projects on the ground-we are currently on target to meet our spend commitment to Government for 2018/19 based on commitments already made, but the target is challenging and we need to be able to demonstrate to Government what our future spend priorities are and that we will be bringing forward projects in our investment programme pipeline. The outcome from the prioritisation exercise will see us set out further key priority projects and programmes which will inform our 10 year investment plan.
- 10.2 In the coming months it will be vital that we understand and work through the detail on the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, which will be key to TVCA's future funding post Brexit. We also need to look at the potential to use our devolution agreement and available TVCA funds to secure greater ongoing investment from national agencies including Arts Council England and lottery distributers, as the potential to secure ongoing revenue to support the cultural sector is substantial.
- 10.3 In conclusion, our plans are ambitious but there has been a lot of great work by everyone involved and we can now see projects coming out of the ground that demonstrate our commitment to increase economic growth in Tees Valley as a place to work, live and visit. We are driving towards stronger partnerships across both the public and private sectors to ensure that together we deliver our investment programme.
